On November 16, an estimated 50 students gave blood in the field house. The event was staffed by 10 Red Cross Workers and 15 NHS volunteers. When asked why he personally gives blood, Alex Wheeler '13 said, “I'm donating blood because I know it goes to people in dire need of assistance, and I know it saves lives.” According to the Red Cross, one pint of blood can save up to three lives, yet not very many students choose to donate.

Anybody 16 or older can give in Massachusetts (with a parental permission slip), so if you meet the age requirement, consider giving next time the school holds a blood drive. “We don't realize how many people need blood, so if you have an opportunity you should give blood,” said Andrea Pulido '13. 5 million American patients need blood per year, and every donation helps to meet that demand.
